



children were being forcibly separated from their parents at the border, and tens of thousands of people seeking refuge at our border from deadly situations in their home countries were being placed in crowded, filthy "camps" under brutal and inhumane conditions.

Many people were horrified by this situation and the historic echoes they brought to mind and the slogan "Never Again Is Now" began to reverberate across the country. We at UUSF took up this slogan and amplified the demands, "No More Kids in Cages", "Shut Down the Camps" at public witnesses on the steps of the sanctuary every Sunday and Wednesday. We gathered monthly to write letters of support to ICE detainees at the Yuba facility and some of our members made visits to detainees. People from a dozen faith groups joined us in September for a rush hour witness event. Some of our members joined UUSC delegations to the border to assist with relief efforts for immigrants. We began sounding a gong in our services every Sunday – 7 times for the 7 children who died in immigration detention – in a ritual that continues to this day.

Now COVID-19, a pandemic like the world has not seen in many decades has radically



changed much in our society. Josh Leash from the UUSC says "In times of crisis, it is easy to get lost in focusing on our immediate needs, without feeling like we have room for big-picture concerns such as human rights. In truth, however, our immediate needs are deeply connected to our human rights. It is precisely in such periods of global distress that human rights protections are most needed." WE MUST BE SAFE BUT WE MUST NOT BE SILENT!

COVID-19 is spreading exponentially in prisons and detention centers with their tight quarters and inadequate hygiene and healthcare. A new ACLU report notes that the spread of disease and death in U.S. jails alone, without rapid intervention, could lead to an additional 100,000 deaths beyond those we're already seeing unfold. We are at a precipice and the need for immediate action is urgent. So we invite you to follow this LINK today to get more information about the situation and actions to take as well as connect with some of the groups that activists within our church community have found helpful as we determine the most effective actions to take.

# Welcome to the First Unitarian Universalist Society of San Francisco

Since its founding in 1850 our congregation has been a beacon of religious liberalism in this city. During the Civil War, the Rev. Thomas Starr King was credited with keeping California in the Union. He also challenged racism, raised millions for humanitarian relief and inspired new efforts in education.

Unitarianism and Universalism in America both arose in New England during the American Revolution. Because the roots of both traditions are in the Judeo-Christian tradition, you will see on the walls of our sanctuary two inscriptions:

"What doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God?" (from the Hebrew prophet Micah) and "The Kingdom of God is within you." (from the Gospels)

Our religious forebears were far more interested in the teaching examples of Jesus than in beliefs about Jesus. Today we agree more about how we strive to treat others than we do about beliefs. Our backgrounds and spiritual orientations are diverse. Among us are people who consider themselves atheists, agnostics, humanists, Christians, Jews, Buddhists, Muslims, Pagans and people guided by other forms of spirituality and belief.

Belief is many things, and so is disbelief. But we are interested in what happens to us when we open our minds to wider truth, our hearts to compassion, and our souls to the call to work for justice and peace.
