

### OFFERTORY

Faith in Action is a national community organizing network that gives people of faith the tools that they need to fight for justice and work towards a more equitable Its "Belong Emergency Fund" was created in April of last year and has distributed 100% of all donations that came in to undocumented people who lost their job or had to quarantine due to the pandemic. Through donations the organization gave away 300 Visa cards with \$200 to families. In addition, to COVID positive people in quarantine/ hospitalized they gave \$400 per family member not working to help them stay afloat. Many congregations and individuals have donated throughout this past year. 100% of donations go to affected families. You can donate directly to Faith in Action, but giving through UUSF will generate the matched grant. (www.faithinactionba.org)

The Hinckley Fund was established in 1879 following the instructions in the will of Captain William Hinckley. He and his wife Alice were members of the Society, and his will requires that future Trustees of the Fund also be members of UUSF. Each year the Fund awards grants to fulfil the Captain's desire to further religion, learning, and charity. In Captain Hinckley's own words, "He was so impressed with the idea that his later prosperity was owing to no special wit or talent of his that he wanted to set apart a portion of his prosperity as a memorial of the good Providence that had befriended him." This year, the current Hinckley trustees requested UUSF to commit funds to COVID relief as part of the Hinckley grant to the church.





It will cover the current issues facing domestic workers and their priorities for change; how employers and other allies can support these workers through policy current campaigns; and beyond-- including a campaign currently going on in San Francisco to win PTO for domestic workers how COVID affects all of this.

Speakers include Nancy Krebs, Hand in Hand member and former park naturalist who enjoys spending time outdoors. In caring for her 91-year old mother and 89-year old aunt, she has experienced the difficulty of navigating the health system and believes that supporting fair pay and working conditions for domestic workers will help all of us age with dignity. Born and raised in San Francisco, Molly works to make sure domestic workers in our city can access secure and well-compensated jobs so that they can continue to live and thrive in the place we call home.

### Pro Truth: Why Truth Matters In Our Politics & Social Media

Sunday, April 25 at 1:00 pm

How can we turn back the tide of post-truth politics, fake news, and misinformation that is damaging our democracy? Author and former journalist Tim Ward will share what he learned while writing book Pro Truth: A Practical Plan for Putting Truth Back into Politics together with cognitive neuroscientist Dr. Gleb Tsipursky. Tim breaks down what it will take to make truth matter into three parts: First, empower citizens to recognize and resist political lies and deceptions. Tim will talk about the tricks post-truth politicians use to exploit our mental blindspots and strategies to protect ourselves from these threats. Second, by addressing the damage caused by the spread of fake news on social media. Tim will talk about how to "scrub your bubble," fight digital misinformation, and engage with those who disagree with you in a productive way. Third, Tim will talk about what we can to pressure politicians, media, and other public figures to respect the truth. To put this plan into action requires the rise of a Pro-Truth Movement - a movement which has already begun.

Tim Ward is co-author of the book Pro Truth: A Practical Plan for Putting Truth Back into Politics. He's on the Board of Directors that oversees the Pro Truth Pledge, founded by his co-author Dr. Gleb Tsipursky. Together they wrote Pro Truth to help people protect themselves from the lies of politicians, and to create a pro-truth movement that they believe is essential for democracy. Tim is also the coowner of Intermedia Communications Training, Inc. Based in the Washington D.C. area, he works with global environmental and development organizations, helping them communicate better.





## Welcome to the First Unitarian Universalist Society of San Francisco

Since its founding in 1850 our congregation has been a beacon of religious Diberalism in this city. During the Civil War, the <u>Rev. Thomas Starr King</u> was credited with keeping California in the Union. He also challenged racism, raised millions for humanitarian relief and inspired new efforts in education.

Unitarianism and Universalism in America both arose in New England during the American Revolution. Because the roots of both traditions are in the Judeo-Christian tradition, you will see on the walls of our sanctuary two inscriptions:

"What doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God?" (from the Hebrew prophet Micah) and "The Kingdom of God is within you." (from the Gospels)

Our religious forebears were far more interested in the teaching examples of Jesus than in beliefs about Jesus. Today we agree more about how we strive to treat others than we do about beliefs. Our backgrounds and spiritual orientations are diverse. Among us are people who consider themselves atheists, agnostics, humanists, Christians, Jews, Buddhists, Muslims, Pagans and people guided by other forms of spirituality and belief.

Belief is many things, and so is disbelief. But we are interested in what happens to us when we open our minds to wider truth, our hearts to compassion, and our souls to the call to work for justice and peace.
