

# **ABOUT**

I (Rev. Cheryl M. Walker) was born and raised in the East Harlem section of New York City. My parents both worked outside of the home; my dad worked for the Metropolitan Transit Authority, and my mom worked in a Head Start Center (she eventually became the Director after she graduated from college, a year before I did). I am the third of their four children. My mother was a Southerner and my father a New Yorker, so I learned to navigate different cultures at an early age.

I loved growing up in New York with all of its diversity. There were people speaking different languages, who ate different foods, celebrated different holidays. I learned to love our differences and not fear them. I also gained an early sense of independence as I did not need a car or driver's license to go places. That, too, stays with me.

I was raised as a Muslim, which imbued me with an ontological security in who I was as an African American. Eventually, I found Islam's tent too small, and I searched for a new faith home. It would take me 30 years to find Unitarian Universalism. I still keep some of the practices from my faith background; I pray five times a day or more, and I don't eat pork.



After graduating college, I began a career in technology, primarily on Wall Street. Working in corporate America gave me the ability to help my family financially, and I gained analytical and managerial skills. It was a good career for 25 years, but eventually I felt a call to serve humanity and my God through Unitarian Universalist ministry.

In 2004, I graduated from Union Theological Seminary in New York and was the recipient of the Maxwell Fellowship for the promise of excellence in ministry. Shortly before I graduated, I met Elizabeth, and we have been together ever since.

For four years, I served as the assistant Minister at the Unitarian Church of All Souls of New York, and for the past thirteen years, I have been the solo Minister of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Wilmington.





#### Open Door Legal - Forum with Adrian Tirtanadi - Sunday, March 24, 9:30 am TSK Room

Open Door Legal (ODL) is a nonprofit organization that has been working to create the first system of universal access to legal care in San Francisco. The organization aims to end injustices such as domestic violence, wage theft, wrongful foreclosures, and illegal expropriation, which are the most prevalent issues in the United States. The organization believes that universal access to civil legal representation is the most cost-effective way to address poverty and can save the city up to \$4 on emergency services for every \$1 spent on its implementation. Open Door Legal operates as a "general hospital" in this system, focusing on building a layer of triage and general practice. Adrian Tirtanadi, a summa cum laude graduate of the University of Maryland, was inspired to think systemically about poverty and find solutions. After graduating law school, he founded ODL, which has grown almost 200 times in 10 years. Over the past decade, ODL has secured over 50 million dollars in assets for low-income communities of color, with employee satisfaction rates in the top 5% of all US workplaces. #### Minister's Book Group, led by Rev. Vanessa Rush Southern

**Rev. Vanessa Rush Southern** will host a Zoom discussion on March 20 at 6:30 pm regarding the book Starry Messenger: Cosmic Perspectives on Civilization by Neil deGrasse Tyson. You will find additional details regarding the book as well as a registration link below.

Dr. Tyson, director of the Hayden Planetarium at the American Museum of Natural History, has been serving since 1996. He is also the host and cofounder of the popular podcast StarTalk, which combines science, humor, and pop culture. Dr. Tyson is a recipient of 21 honorary doctorates, the Public Welfare Medal from the National Academy of Sciences, and the Distinguished Public Service Medal from NASA. Asteroid 13123 Tyson is named in his honor. Galileo Galilei's publication Sidereus Nuncius in 1610 brought cosmic truths to Earth, including observations of the Sun, Moon, stars, planets, and the Milky Way. The book emphasized that human eyes alone cannot reveal fundamental truths about nature and that Earth is not the center of all motion. These cosmic perspectives prompted people to rethink their relationships to one another, Earth, and the cosmos. Join the starry adventure outward and inward guided by Dr. Tyson!
