

Today we welcome choristers from Kensington Unitarian Universalist Church, Bryan Baker, director.


Severely self-critical, Maurice Duruflé composed very little. His best-known organ works are his *Prélude, adagio, and choral varié sur le "Veni Creator"* (op. 4) and his *Prélude et fugue sur le nom d'Alain*, Op. 7, composed in memory of organist and contemporary Jehan Alain (1911–1940), killed in World War II. The four motets of Op. 10 are also well-known, especially the lovely *Ubi caritas*, which we, at UUSF, have sung several times. But unquestionably, he is most famous for his masterpiece, the Requiem (Op. 9).

The Requiem is heavily influenced by plainchant, as are the motets and other Duruflé works. The Requiem, from 1947, began as a series of organ works based on chant, a genre common enough for organists at the time. As a church organist, Duruflé would have performed at many, many Requiem masses, and pieces drawing on the plainchant for these masses would have been very useful. Then, when Duruflé's publisher commissioned a choral work, the composer used the organ works as the foundation for the mass, which is conceived to be accompanied by either an organ (as Reiko Oda Lane will feature) or an orchestra, which includes a part for the organ.

On Saturday, April 20 the soloists in the Kensington performance will be our own Akane Ota and Andrew Kessler.

Ukraine & Russia: On the Brink of World War III?- Sunday, April 14, 9:30 am TSK Room

Sunday Forum with Anthony D'Agostino. The war in Ukraine has reached a stalemate, with devastating loss of life. The U.S. should not judge "rights" but rather people decide war or peace. Ukraine is in its national epoch, similar to Italy, Germany, or Serbia. Laughing off Putin's historical claims shows ignorance of history. The end of globalization is the return of great-power politics, not the Cold War. Our period is not one of the Cold War but of the origins of World War 3. Anthony D'Agostino, a Professor Emeritus of History at San Francisco State University, has published five books on international politics.

Animal Rights and the Law - Sunday, April 28, 9:30 am TSK Room

Sunday Forum with Wayne Hsiung. Wayne Hsiung, an internationally recognized animal rescuer and investigator, co-founded animal rights organizations Direct Action Everywhere and The Simple Heart Initiative. He has been involved in a mass movement for open rescue of animals from factory farms and animal exploitation industries. Hsiung studied law and economics at the University of Chicago and taught at the Northwestern School of Law and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He has been jailed for 38 days for organizing a peaceful protest and the open rescue of chickens and ducks from factory farms. He was previously facing a maximum 16-year prison sentence for rescuing beagles from Ridglan Farms in Wisconsin. Charges were dropped before trial to keep criminal abuses hidden. Hsiung continues to fight for animals despite the efforts of powerful industries. More info: https://www.uusf.org/forum

Ministers' Book Group: April and May - On Repentance and Repair, by Rabbi Danya Ruttenberg

In April and May, Revs. Shennum and Southern will lead three sessions on Rabbi Ruttenberg's book, On Repentance and Repair: Making Amends in an Unapologetic World. This book is the UUA Common Read for this year and offers a framework for how we look at making amends and how we work toward forgiveness and repair that applies to both personal transgressions and the legacy of larger societal systemic harms (like the legacy of enslavement, sexual harassment and violence, Native genocide, and displacement) Rabbi Ruttenberg draws from the work of the great medieval Jewish philosopher Maimonides.
