

Humanists and Non-Theists Can Future Pandemics Be Prevented?

Sunday, January 24 at 1:00 PM

Natural mechanisms that check overpopulation of species include starvation, predation, conflict within and among species and diseases. Humans have been able to blunt most of these mechanisms leading to a population that burden's earth's resources and is changing the climate. However, in human history there have been a number of diseases that have reduced human populations significantly (e.g. the Black Death, the 1918



Flue pandemic). With Covid-19, humanity is faced, once again, with a disease that has spread throughout the world bringing a large number of deaths and suffering from the disease, breakdown of economic activity and interruption of normal human activity such as education, travel and social gatherings.

Covid-19, like many other diseases jumped to the human population from other animals. It has been estimated that there are 800,000 viruses in animals that can potentially jump to humans and cause pandemics. Are we entering an age of pandemics caused by human overpopulation, international mobility, human incursion into previously pristine areas exposing humans to novel pathogens, political division that politicizes public health measures, and overconsumption by wealthy nations? Science and medicine have impressively produced diagnostic tests and vaccines that may save humanity this time, but are there ways to catch the emergence of new infectious diseases before pandemics cause so much harm? Scientists are now attempting characterizing all viruses found in nature.

This is made possible by advances in scientific technologies and scientist working together around the world. The United States has played a leading role in this effort by training scientist in developing countries how to detect and characterize viruses and public health measures that can prevent wide spread infection. Many of these countries controlled Covid-19 before it decimated their populations and economies, but surprisingly the US and many other wealthy countries failed to implement these measures in a timely manner resulting in an out of control Covid-19 pandemic. We will view videos that describe scientific programs that may help prevent future pandemics.






Special BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) Gathering 1st Sunday of the Month from 9:30 AM to 10:50 AM

Have you been looking for a way to build a deeper connection within the UUSF community – especially during the challenges of shelter in place? The Small Group Ministries program is an excellent way to do that. Sign up for the Spring 2021 session, open now through January 29, 2021. Many participants have found Small Group Ministries as a way to deepen their connection with the congregation and build meaningful friendships and support with individual members.

What can you expect? SGM groups meet for 2 hours every other week with groups of 10 people. Initial sessions will meet virtually through Zoom and will transition to in person meetings when it is possible to do that safely at the church.

Through moderated discussion and deep listening, participants explore a range of issues and topics related to spirituality, social justice and personal growth. Past topics have included understanding spiritual experiences, gratitude, Black Lives Matter, mortality and after life, connection, and the arts. The order of services allows everyone to participate with two skilled facilitators leading the discussion. Members have the option to select topics for sessions, and there is a community service project incorporated into the series that lets everyone volunteer in a meaningful way.



Welcome to the First Unitarian Universalist Society of San Francisco

Since its founding in 1850 our congregation has been a beacon of religious liberalism in this city. During the Civil War, the <u>Rev. Thomas Starr King</u> was credited with keeping California in the Union. He also challenged racism, raised millions for humanitarian relief and inspired new efforts in education.

Unitarianism and Universalism in America both arose in New England during the American Revolution. Because the roots of both traditions are in the Judeo-Christian tradition, you will see on the walls of our sanctuary two inscriptions:

"What doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God?" (from the Hebrew prophet Micah) and "The Kingdom of God is within you." (from the Gospels)

Our religious forebears were far more interested in the teaching examples of Jesus than in beliefs about Jesus. Today we agree more about how we strive to treat others than we do about beliefs. Our backgrounds and spiritual orientations are diverse. Among us are people who consider themselves atheists, agnostics, humanists, Christians, Jews, Buddhists, Muslims, Pagans and people guided by other forms of spirituality and belief.

Belief is many things, and so is disbelief. But we are interested in what happens to us when we open our minds to wider truth, our hearts to compassion, and our souls to the call to work for justice and peace.
