Faithful Fools began in 1998 when the paths of Kay Jorgensen, social justice minister of UUSF, and Carmen Barsody, of the Franciscan Community in Little Falls, MN, converged on the streets of the Tenderloin District in San Francisco. Kay had been opening a path between the church and the Tenderloin Neighborhood, inviting people from the church into the community and people from the community into the church. Beginning in 1999 Kay and Carmen taught a class at Starr King School for the Ministry titled: Bearing Witness at the Crossroads of Community and Parish. It was through that class that people preparing for ministry, began walking up and down the hill doing a shared internship between UUSF and Faithful Fools. Kay and Carmen were also a part of Urban Disciples, a coalition of UU congregations and ministers from around the U.S. who were funded by the Veatch Foundation to develop and share diverse models for effective, accountable social justice ministry.

Through Street Retreats, volunteering and collaborative works for justice, people of all ages and many walks of life have shared in the ongoing mission and work of Faithful Fools as we "discover our common humanity on the streets." More Info: <u>https://www.faithfulfools.org/</u>

Ka'ala Carmack, native Hawaiian, studied Portuguese & Haitian Creole in the US Navy, has Bachelor's and Masters of Music degrees from Indiana University in Romance Languages and Vocal Music, and a Masters degree in Ethnomusicology from UC Santa Barbara. Recently he was Instructor of Hawaiian Music at UH Windward Community College on Oahu. He is an extraordinary musical reservoir of Hawaiian culture and celebrates music as a living, evolving expression of his love for all styles of music.

Rosalie Alfonso, a native of San Francisco, studied and performed with the San Francisco Taiko Dojo (ret.), has a Bachelor's degree in Art and in Dance, and a Master's degree in Creative Arts Education from San Francisco State University with experience in arts administration. Enjoys being a member of the Grandview Drive-by Aloha Band, playing music with Ka'ala and Bill.

"Across the Veil" - November 6 Worship Service

This is the time of year of the Pagan celebration of Samhain, and the Christian (no doubt borrowed and adapted!) witness to All Souls and All Saints, and to the celebrations of Día De Los Muertos in Mexico and across Latin America. All of these community and religious ceremonies and sacred times begin with the Samhain idea that at this time of year the veil between the living and the dying is thinned. It is a season, therefore, for reaching across that veil and pulling those we have loved and lost, their spirit and their legacy, more intentionally into our world for a while.

"BEING ALIVE" OCTOBER 16

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Welcome to the First Unitarian Universalist Society of San Francisco

Since its founding in 1850 our congregation has been a beacon of religious liberalism in this city. During the Civil War, the Rev. Thomas Starr King was credited with keeping California in the Union. He also challenged racism, raised millions for humanitarian relief and inspired new efforts in education.

Unitarianism and Universalism in America both arose in New England during the American Revolution. Because the roots of both traditions are in the Judeo-Christian tradition, you will see on the walls of our sanctuary two inscriptions:

"What doth the Lord require of thee, but to do justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God?" (from the Hebrew prophet Micah) and "The Kingdom of God is within you." (from the Gospels)

Our religious forebears were far more interested in the teaching examples of Jesus than in beliefs about Jesus. Today we agree more about how we strive to treat others than we do about beliefs. Our backgrounds and spiritual orientations are diverse. Among us are people who consider themselves atheists, agnostics, humanists, Christians, Jews, Buddhists, Muslims, Pagans and people guided by other forms of spirituality and belief.

Belief is many things, and so is disbelief. But we are interested in what happens to us when we open our minds to wider truth, our hearts to compassion, and our souls to the call to work for justice and peace.
