

He chaired the Hymnbook Commission that produced Singing the Living Tradition, served on the Ministerial Fellowship Committee for 8 years. He has been active since before ordination in GLBTQ+ advocacy. He has written two books published by Skinner House Press, "Sonata for Voice and Silence", and "Nothing Gold Can Stay", a book on grief. He preached the Sermon of the Living Tradition at General Assembly in 1998 about what he learned from a member of this congregation, Margaret J Hanson.





#### **UUSF Election Slate 2023-24**

The Nominating Committee is pleased to present the slate of nominees for the 2023-2024 Board of Trustees and the next Nominating Committee. In accordance with the UUSF by-laws, the slate will be voted on at the annual meeting of the membership on June 4, 2023. **Board of Trustees:** The Board consists of nine members, five of whom are elected in "odd" years (2023) and four of whom are elected in "even" years. Board members are elected to two-year terms and may not serve more than six consecutive years. The nominees for this year are Lori Lai (incumbent); Linda Enger (incumbent); Megan Lehmer (incumbent); Sam King: and Galen Workman.

Nominating Committee: This Committee consists of seven members, four of whom are elected in "odd" years (2023) and three of whom are elected in "even" years. Nominating Committee members are elected to two-year terms and may not serve more than four consecutive years. The nominees for this year are Erica Murray (incumbent); Teresa Goebel (incumbent); Hanna Hart; and Robert Packenham.

We are grateful to our nominees for their willingness to serve in these leadership roles. While the Nominating Committee works hard to fulfill this vital role of nominations, remember we work throughout the year to build and support leadership at UUSF by connecting UUSF congregants with opportunities for service and connections.
