

Animal Rights and the Law with Wayne Hsiung - April 28, 9:30 am TSK Room/Zoom

Wayne Hsiung is an attorney who is an internationally recognized animal rescuer and investigator. Wayne was recently jailed for 38 days for organizing a peaceful protest and the open rescue of chickens and ducks from factory farms in Sonoma County, California. He was facing a maximum 16-year prison sentence last month for rescuing beagles from the 2nd largest breeder of dogs for experimentation in the U.S., Ridgland Farms in Dane County, Wisconsin. Charges were abruptly dropped right before trial to keep hidden from the public various criminal abuses of the dogs. Wayne has since petitioned for a special prosecutor to charge Ridgland Farms. Wayne works for animals despite the efforts of powerful industries to stop him and the dangers of the factory farming system in this country. Palestine, Israel, and The U.S. Empire. Sunday Forum with Richard Becker - May 5, 9:30 am TSK Room/Zoom

The ongoing conflict in Palestine and other Middle Eastern countries has worsened since October 7, with 30,000 Palestinian civilian deaths and 70,000 injuries. The situation is considered the worst war statistics in history, potentially leading to a broader international nuclear conflict. Protests demand the United States to end its support for the Israeli government, but so far, no avail. Richard Becker, the Western regional coordinator of the ANSWER Coalition, offers insights into what American citizens can do to understand and stop this immoral conflict and what actions are needed to ensure justice and equality for all involved. Ministers' Book Group: April and May - On Repentance and Repair, by Rabbi Danya Ruttenberg

In April and May, Revs. Shennum and Southern will lead three sessions on Rabbi Ruttenberg's book, *On Repentance and Repair: Making Amends in an Unapologetic World*. This book is the UUA Common Read for this year and offers a framework for how we look at making amends and how we work toward forgiveness and repair that applies to both personal transgressions and the legacy of larger societal systemic harms (like the legacy of enslavement, sexual harassment and violence, Native genocide, and displacement) Rabbi Ruttenberg draws from the work of the great medieval Jewish philosopher Maimonides.
