

The offering today goes to support the work of the United Nations Relief and Work Agency (UNRWA), which was established in 1949 by a U.N. General Assembly Resolution to help Palestinians who were displaced from their homes after the founding of Israel. Today, UNRWA employs 30,000 Palestinians to serve the humanitarian needs of refugees in the Gaza Strip, the West Bank, and other camps. For the past six months, because of continued airstrikes and total devastation in the Gaza Strip, over 34,000 people, including over 14,000 children, have been killed and many are missing. The people now face mass starvation and the imminent risk of famine. UNRWA USA calls for an immediate ceasefire to ensure the safety of civilians and unimpeded access to humanitarian resources. 
