

Human Rights Campaign San Francisco Community Health Center Wellness Clinic

Human Rights Campaign (HRC) is working tirelessly with our in-state partners to prevent these bills from becoming law. Prospects for Restraining Militarism in U.S. Foreign Policy with Norman Solomon Sunday Forum, January 26, 9:30 am, TSK Room and on Zoom. A light breakfast will be available beginning at 9:00 a.m.

More than two decades after the U.S. invasion of Iraq, the U.S. remains deeply involved in military actions across the Middle East, including missile strikes and extensive arms support for Israel. Norman Solomon will address the ongoing "madness of militarism," as described by Martin Luther King Jr., highlighting how U.S. media and political actions have contributed to the intensification of ethnic cleansing in Palestine and the genocide in Gaza, funded by American taxpayers. He will also evaluate the potential for reducing militarism in U.S. foreign policy in the coming years. Solomon, the national director of RootsAction.org and executive director of the Institute for Public Accuracy, has recently published a paperback edition of his book, War Made Invisible, which discusses the human costs of U.S. military actions, including an afterword on Gaza.
