



The Ways of Remembrance ensemble, consisting of Joel Karabo Elliott, Dr. Aditi Sethi, and Jay Brown, is a world music and devotional group formed at the Center for Conscious Living & Dying in Swannanoa, NC. Their music blends contemplative folk, ambient improvisation, and kirtan, drawing inspiration from diverse cultural roots including India, Native America, Appalachia, Southern Africa, and the Caribbean, all rooted in deep listening and trust developed through shared experiences in rites of passage. Dr. Aditi Sethi, a hospice MD and executive director of the Center, along with her husband Jay Brown, a musical poet and music therapist, and Joel Karabo Elliott, a composer and educator, contribute to this ensemble. Today, from 3:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m., the Heart and Soul Center of Light in Oakland, CA, will host a screening of a documentary about Ethan Sisser's journey through dying, followed by a discussion led by Dr. Sethi on community-centered end-of-life care, complemented by live music from the ensemble that emphasizes reverence and connection. 
The Threshold Choir

Threshold Choir (https://thresholdchoir.org/), which turned 25 this year, is a group whose vision is "a world where all at life's thresholds may be honored with compassion shared through song." Each Threshold Choir chapter is firmly rooted in its local community while also being an important part of our shared community as an international organization. Singers receive specialized training around death and grief, bringing calm to the bedside and producing a lullaby-like, harmonized blend of sound. Threshold Choir is a 501(c)(3) organization. Rev. Alyson Jacks was part of the San Francisco choir, and they have sung before at UUSF.



The We Will Not Look Away Vigil will take place on Sunday, August 17, at 8:00 am on the front steps of UUSF, organized by the UUSF Human Rights Working Group. Participants are invited to gather in grief for the lives lost in Palestine and to reignite a sense of shared humanity.
