



About

Diane Miller is a Minnesotan who went to Macalester College and then Harvard Divinity School, with a year out for anti-war activities. She began with an Interim Ministry at the Follen Church (yes, the women's group was Follen Women) in Lexington, MA (1975-76), before coming to UUSF, where she was Assistant Minister, Interim Senior Minister, then Associate Minister over the span of five years. She was called to Belmont, MA, in 1981, where she and Michael Durall raised two sons. She went on to serve as UUA Director of Ministry from 1993 to 2001, followed by several interim ministries, including Walnut Creek, CA. A final settled ministry followed before she retired in 2016 after 40 years of service. Drawn by grandchildren, she has settled in Salina, Kansas.

Christoph Wagner, a prize-winning German cellist and Assistant Professor at the University of New Mexico, and Joanne Kong, a critically acclaimed pianist and harpsichordist from the University of Richmond and a prominent vegan advocate, form the renowned Wagner & Kong Duo, celebrated for their sensitive and passionate artistry. They will perform at the REFLECTIONS event on October 12th at 6 pm, featuring classical music, ethical food by Chef Kenny, and a community discussion on compassionate living. The event, located at 223 Grand Avenue, South San Francisco, has a suggested donation of \$50.


Offertory Update


